Chemistry: KS3 Autumn Term 🗦



What are we learning, why are we learning it and how you can support.

Dear Students and Parents,

The Church Stretton Science department aims to help our students become scientifically literate, where they can describe, define, investigate and ultimately try to understand the world in which they live and how it works. We have been busy this term focussing on some key concepts, which, as outlined below are revisited and extended on a regularly basis. Here's a breakdown of what each year group has been getting up to this half-term alongside some useful links that will help you support their study.

Year 7 'Particles and their behaviour'



Why are we studying this?

This topic is one of the fundamental building blocks for developing students' understanding of chemistry. It is one of the 'big ideas' of science and the concepts covered within the topic will be developed further as we move from the amorphous particle to atoms, molecules and compounds, to how atoms react to form new substances. In this topic students will be introduced to the particle model and look at what happens to particles during changes of state, and their role in diffusion.

Year 9 'Metals and acids'



Why are we studying this?

The 'big idea' of particles is yet again revisited, with this topic drawing on students' knowledge of particles, molecules and atoms whilst also revisiting acids and alkalis. On this occasion students will focus on acids and their reaction with metals, investigating what happens when metals react with other substances, such as, metal carbonates and metal oxides with a variety of acids. Students will learn that the reactants determine the products and will be able to explore the tests for certain gases, whilst balancing chemical equations. In Year 10 this topic is revisited again in 'SC8 acids and alkalis' using the knowledge gained here and the idea of ions to explain the reaction of metals and acids.

Year 8 'Acids and alkalis'





Why are we studying this?

This topic builds on the 'bigidea' of particles from Year 7 and how particles join to make compounds. Students will acquire knowledge of acids and alkalis and some of their reactions. They have not met acids and alkalis before and will discover common acids and alkalis, classify and quantify acids and alkalis, and describe what happens during neutralisation reactions. Students will revisit acids and their reaction with metals again in Year 9.

Chemistry: KS4 Autumn Term 🕇



What are we learning, why are we learning it and how you can support.

GCSE chemistry provides students the opportunity to extend and deepen their understanding, providing a firm foundation for studying chemistry beyond GCSE.

Year 10 'Bonding'



Why are we studying this?

'Bonding' builds on the ideas of solids, liquids and gases and changes of state and the idea of elements in Year 7. In Year 8 students learnt about metals and non-metal properties and their position on the periodic table and were introduced to the concept of sub-atomic particles in Year 9 and how this relates to the way elements react and form chemical bonds by the exchange or sharing of electrons. This topic also explores the type of bonding models we use and how the type of bonding relates to physical properties.

Year 11 'Electrolytic processes'




Why are we studying this?

This topics builds on the foundation work from KS3 on the periodic table, metals, chemical formulae and word equations. By Year 9 students have looked at the reactions of metals with oxygen and displacement reactions. During Year 10 the idea of atoms and ions is the foundation for explaining how compounds are decomposed using electricity in electrolysis. This topic is the groundwork for electrochemistry at KS5 with students discovering what happens to ions during electrolysis. Students will have the opportunity to investigate the electrolysis of copper sulfate using inert electrodes and copper electrodes, students will learn how to predict the products of electrolysis.

Year 9 Foundation Examinations 22nd to 26th January 2024

The Foundation Examinations will take place w/b 22nd January which gives Year 9 a clear fortnight after the Christmas holidays before the exams start, this will ensure all students can see each of their subject teachers at least once before their exam. A launch assembly for the Foundation Examinations will be held with Year 9 on the morning of Tuesday 9th January, during which we will explain the importance of revision. The exams will allow you and your child to see where their strengths lie in the Foundation subjects as they begin to think about their GCSE pathways choices, this process will start later in the Spring term.

The Foundation Examinations are an important indicator of progress made by students and although there will be preparation taking place in lessons, the expectation is that this is supplemented and supported with revision at home. Our Parent/Carers guide to effective revision can be found on the school website here, and it is full of ways that you can help your child to prepare for their exams. We have invested in an online revision tool called Seneca Learning; your child has the log in details for this. Please encourage them to use this along with the other sign posted revision resources on GO 4 Schools for each subject.



Belgium Tournament 2023

I play for Wolves under-12s and on Remembrance Sunday our team qualified to play the in 2023 Christmas Truce Tournament in December in Ypres, Belgium.

During my time in Belgium, I had an amazing experience not only just playing football but learning wise as well. We visited the World War one frontline and re-enacted what they would of had to do. Alongside this it was a pleasure to represent Wolves, reaching the semi-finals and ending 4th overall. There were 11 other teams taking part, we exchanged gifts for the Truce tournament. We all had to write a poem about the war and I was lucky enough to have mine published within the premiere league Truce booklet.

Tommy Williams Year 7

Each year the Premier League, in conjunction with Big Ideas, invites clubs to participate in the Christmas Truce Challenge, where academies are tasked with engaging the whole club and its surrounding community around a given topic.

The 2023 Truce Project theme is Windrush75 with two key elements – the first being Walter Tull and the significant impact he made.

Tull was a professional footballer and became the first black serving officer in the army during World War One. He played for Clapton FC, Tottenham and Northampton Town and also signed for Rangers, but never played for the Gers due to the outbreak of WW1.

The second part of the project is around social action and how the boys can engage and celebrate the contribution of the Windrush generation in the local community.

"The project is hugely important to help the children remember that the statistics they hear about on the news were, in fact, very real people with families and probably came from backgrounds not too different to them. It's good to get them to visit the trench in Staffordshire, so they can get some idea about the conditions that the men had to endure. "The boys will take with them to Ypres, a huge appreciation of the sacrifice that was made by all those involved in the First and Second World Wars."

Online Safety Update

Loot boxes and skins betting.









What are they?

Loot boxes: a feature of online games where players pay to get unknown rewards, like items or modifications for their character. It's similar to gambling, because most of the time you don't know what you're going to get before you pay. One example is FIFA player packs, where you buy a 'pack' of players, but don't know who you're going to get when you make the purchase.

Skins betting: where people use 'skins' as betting currency ('skins' are extra items in online games that e.g., upgrade a weapon or character into a better one). You can earn real money if you win. People usually do this through specific websites that let you use skins to bet.

What's the problem?

- Some children say they end up chasing a win with loot boxes, like gamblers do
- Skins betting is a backdoor way for children to gamble underage
- Gambling can be addictive, like drugs or alcohol, with a severe impact on emotional health and wellbeing
- Teens have reported spending hundreds of pounds in a year on loot boxes, and losing skins worth thousands through gambling

3 steps you can take

1. Make sure your child knows the risks

Your child might not realise they could lose hundreds or thousands of pounds. They might not understand the risk of addiction or that, in general, it's illegal to gamble when you're under 18.

Explain that websites which guarantee wins or have offers that seem too good to be true are using these as a way to entice you in. Ultimately, behind these promotions is a business looking to make money.

Explain how loot boxes are also like gambling as you take a risk for the chance of a reward. Tell them they should report skins gambling websites to the Gambling Commission: https://bit.ly/2JnBtm7

2. Set limits on in-game spending to control how much your child can spend

This will also help you stop them from spending loads of money without realising it. **Please note**: when following the instructions below, the exact steps you need to take may be a little different depending on the device and software version you're using.

On Xbox:

- Go into your family settings and choose a child account
- Select Privacy & online safety
- Xbox Live privacy
- View details & customise
- Buy & download
- Select 'On' in the 'Ask a parent' box

On **Android** devices:

- Open the Play Store and go to your profile by tapping the profile icon in the top right
- Select Settings
- Select Authentication
- Tap 'Require authentication for purchases'
- Choose your preferred setting and follow the on-screen instructions

On **Apple** devices:

- Go into Settings
- Select Screen Time
- Tap Content and Privacy Restrictions (enter your passcode if asked)
- Select iTunes and App Store Purchases
- Choose a setting (for example, in app purchases) and set to 'Don't allow'

On **PlayStation**:

- Go to Settings > Parental Controls/Family Management > Family Management
- Select the user you want to set a spending limit for
- Select 'Applications/Devices/Network Features' under the 'Parental Controls' section
- Select 'Monthly Spending Limit' and press X

You'll need to set up accounts for family members, with adult and child accounts, and make sure you and other adults have family manager or parent/guardian status. Read more about how to do this here: https://bit.ly/2Wk3Jer

3. Know the signs of problematic activity

Look out for signs, like if your child:

- Is short of money or has unexplained sources of money
- Becomes secretive or starts lying
- Loses interest in school and other hobbies, as well as in their health and appearance
- Has mood swings if they're not able to access games or devices
- Speak to our school if you're concerned about your child, and seek support from organisations like BigDeal (https://www.bigdeal.org.uk) and the Gambling Commission.




