





Year 10 Geology Trip

Last week on Thursday 8th June the Yr10 Geology class set out on their first field trip to The Ercall quarry, just south of the M54 between Telford and Shrewsbury, to solve the mystery of the quarry's geological history.

In 1974 Ercall hill was extensively mined for its Quartzite rock to construct the foundations of the M54, but now it belongs to the Shropshire Wildlife Trust and is open to the public for exploration. Upon arrival we took a short wander through the woods to reach the main quarry where we did our preliminary sketches of the rock face, we then climbed a short but steep section of the hill to get closer to the mystery of The Ercall Unconformity! We took rock samples and made notes on what they were and where we found them before beginning our puzzling over the creation of this incredible hill. After much deliberation — with no help from Mr. Elkins — we worked out that the main structure of the hill was an igneous rock called Granophyre, formed 540 million years ago (Mya). The unconformity (at Ercall this is between the Granophyre and the next layer of sedimentary rock known as Breccio-conglomerate) is where the rock surface is eroded and then later in time, a new layer of sediment is deposited on top of the eroded surface. The time gap (geological history we can't study) at this unconformity was a staggering 7 million years!

We then proceeded to our next stop further along the quarry where we practiced some more fieldwork techniques like measuring the angle and direction the rock beds dip and we also looked at a special sedimentary structure in the Quartzite. This structure was ripple marks, by the symmetrical pattern they had we deduced that this Quartzite had been deposited on a beach as the water goes back and forth producing the symmetrical pattern, so had we been standing there 533 Mya we would have been on the coast of England!

For our final stop we dropped by the local "restaurant" (McDonald's, don't tell anyone!) and had our lunch before heading back to school after a long day of puzzle-solving!


