
Mindfulness Afternoon

GCSE Geography Field Trip 28/09/22

Recently geography students ventured into Carding Mill Valley on a fieldtrip. They visited 9 separate areas of the valley, including near the café and the spout waterfall. Using ranging poles, we measured the width of the river. Then, we used a metre ruler to measure the depth and, using a dog biscuit as a marker, we calculated the river's velocity across a 10m period. The highlight of the trip was at the end when some of us got to go to the café and get a hot chocolate or an ice-cream!

Year 10 Geography Field Trip

In December, Year 10 Geography students went on a field study trip to Birmingham investigate the impacts of urban regeneration in four areas of the city and to later answer our enquiry question: "To what extent was the regeneration of Brindley Place the most successful urban regeneration in Birmingham?". As well as Brindley place the students analysed three other places: The Mailbox, The Bullring and East side. Each with various levels of success; when asking our questionnaires, the older generation were more willing to stop and talk! 




Mary Webb School

Meole Brace School

In the last week of February,
49 students from Meole Brace School
took to the snowy slopes at les Menuires
in Trois Vallées in France. This was a return
visit to an area last visited in 2018.

Conditions were glorious, with sunshine and blue skies each day. In an area with 370



different trails to roam, students made the very best of their time exploring all over the valley with new routes being attempted each day.

Students had an excellent time and made amazing progress over the six days. Some had previously skied, and others had never been on a pair of skis before. Under the expert tuition of the instructors, most groups progressed onto the red and blue slopes, enjoying views of Mont Blanc in the distance from heights of up to 2800 metres. Shooting over the jumps in the Snow Park was a great source of amusement, with students taking to the air with varying degrees of success!

It was an action-packed time for all, and everyone embraced the opportunity to try new things. Students took the opportunity to practise their French, and are proud of their many new skiing skills, in some cases even including 360 degree turns (on purpose!).

Students took part in a variety of evening activities, with a highlight being the pizza night in a local restaurant. An amusing spectacle was the Winter Games at night, where students competed in sub-zero temperatures to complete a sequence of challenges, bringing to the surface some very competitive natures. A breath-taking demonstration where the instructors from the valley skied down from the heights with torches in the dark created an amazing, illuminated display alongside fifty drones with lights forming beautiful images in the night sky.

Year 9 Prosthetics STEM class

Students in Year 9 back in December participated in a special STEM (Science Technology Engineering Maths) challenge in the final week of term, organised by the Smallpiece Foundation, in which they were challenged to make a prosthetic hand. This construction project involved cutting and attaching small pieces together to make a working hand, in a limited amount of time. The students rose to the challenge wonderfully and there were many excellent models made. Prosthetics is a field of STEM which is growing very rapidly and the technology can be used not only to replace injured or missing limbs, but also as a way of augmenting our strength.
