Dear Parents & Carers,

It was lovely to welcome pupils back to school after what we hope was an enjoyable Easter break. Whilst this is the start of the summer term, it doesn't yet feel like that, with the rainfall restricting use of the sports fields at break and lunch time still. Hopefully this will change in the near future if we get some sustained better weather!

For all pupils, this term brings significant events in the remaining 13 school weeks of the academic year.

For year 11 pupils there are now 18 school days until the start of the summer exam series. Every moment in school counts, supported by a thorough revision schedule at home, so pupils must be taking every opportunity to talk with their teachers if they are unsure about aspects of the work they have covered.

For year 9 pupils, today is the deadline to submit their subject preferences for their year 10/11 option subjects. Mr Bird, Assistant Headteacher will then collate these to see if we can grant as many first-choice preferences as possible. However, you will appreciate that it is not possible to accommodate everyone's first choice preferences, so follow up conversations will take place where pupils may need to consider different subjects.

Earlier this week, year 9 pupils were engaged in activities provided by the Army Outreach Team who visited school on Wednesday. Alongside informing pupils about opportunities within The Army, pupils enjoyed activities aimed to develop personal skills and qualities such as teamwork, communications and self-confidence. Welcome back to our final term of study in English! We're excited to welcome you back to another term full of exciting learning opportunities in English at Church Stretton School! Here's a breakdown of what each year group will be getting up to this half-term alongside some useful links that will help you support their study.



Year 7 'Poetry Unit'



Why are we studying this?

In the Spring Term, Year 7 will be completing a poetry unit of work that will provide them with strategies for analysing the key literary technique: metaphor. Students will break down the components of metaphors whilst studying a range of famous poets including William Blake and Alfred Lord Tennyson.

Importantly, this unit will provide students with strategies for responding to an unseen poem which is the focus of our Year 7 End of Year Exam.

Their learning is a foundational step, giving students the skills to analyse the language of all future literature texts that they study.

How can you support?

- Below each unit description you will find links to useful resources that can be used to increase students' knowledge and help them read around the subject. We are really keen that students engage with this and would really welcome your encouragement.
- Also, as it is 400 years since the publication of Shakespeare's First Folio, there is a wealth of great programmes on BBC iPlayer that would greatly support our students' study.

Year 9 'Poetry'



Why are we studying this?

On the 24th April, Year 9 students will complete their End of Year Exam which will be on "Small Island." Revision resources have been set on Go4Schools with clear instructions about how to revise.

Then, students begin an exciting exploration of a diverse range of poets including Grace Nichols, W.H. Auden, Wallace Willis, Robert Frost and Simon Armitage. The focus will be on supporting students in writing comparative essays, a crucial stepping stone towards their GCSE poetry study.

Year 8 'Animal Farm'



Why are we studying this?

In Year 8, students embark on the exploration of George Orwell's classic novel, "Animal Farm." In this unit, students will gain an understanding of extended metaphor building on their study of this technique in Year 7. By studying an allegory, students examine how the events of a story can represent historical events and how characters can represent particular people or sections of society. Whilst learning more about the history of the Russian Revolution and totalitarianism, students will explore the themes of power and corruption. This text will be the focus on the Year 8 End of Year Exam.

Year 10 'An Inspector Calls'



Why are we studying this?

In this unit, Year 10 students delve into J.B. Priestley's play 'An Inspector Calls,' building on skills from 'Small Island' by Andrea Levy. They explore themes of social responsibility, class divide, and the consequences of individual actions. Through close analysis of characters and their interactions, students develop critical thinking and analytical skills. Discussions and written tasks deepen their understanding of societal issues, empathy, and moral awareness. By examining the play's context and relevance to contemporary society, students engage with timeless themes, preparing them for thoughtful literary analysis and broader social reflection.



Year 11 Exam Focus



Why are we studying this?

We are really proud of our Year 11 students. They have worked incredibly hard in preparation for their exams. Already this week, students have completed their English Language, Paper 2 Mock Exam, and next week they will sit the English Literature, Paper 2, Section B+C Mock exam (the poetry sections).
